The Great Plan of Redemption

THE FALL OF MAN



Through the transgression of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, all men were **separated** from the presence of God, **both spiritually and temporally**. Thus all men became **unclean** through the sin of our first parents [read Romans 5:12-21].

“Wherefore, as by one man [meaning Adam] sin entered into the world, and ***death by sin***; and so death passed upon ***all*** men, for that ***all*** have sinned.”
[Romans 5:12]

However, men are **not** judged simply because of the sin of their parents, as the Prophet Ezekiel wrote, “Now, lo, if he beget a son, that seeth all his father's sins which he hath done, and considereth, and doeth **not** such like...he shall **not** die for the iniquity of his father, he shall surely live...The soul that sinneth, **it shall die**. The son shall **not** bear the iniquity of the father” [Ezekiel 18:14, 17, 20]

Though what transpired in the Garden of Eden has affected us all, we are **held accountable for our own transgressions**. Paul wrote, “So then every one of us **shall give account of himself to God**.” [Romans 14:12].



Nevertheless, God **knew** that we would fall short of the glory of God. Thus, He established a **great plan of redemption** from the very beginning of the world so that we might be brought back into the presence of God.
